SHABBAT SERVICES

We meet at 4023 Belle Terre Blvd., Myrtle Beach, SC 29579.

On Monday, October 17th, we celebrated the holiday of Simchat Torah, which commemorates the completion of the annual Torah reading cycle. We read from the final verses of the Torah in Deuteronomy, describing the death of Moses at the ripe old age of 120; and then we read the beginning verses in Genesis, which deals with the story of creation.

The Torah plays a very emotional role in Jewish religious life. When it is taken out of the ark and walked around the sanctuary, congregants touch it with the fringes of their tallit or with their prayerbook and then kiss the fringes or the prayerbook. It is considered to be an honor to be given an Aliyah- of being called up to chant the blessings before and after the reading of the Torah.

But how much of what is in the Torah do we really believe?

Do we really believe that the world was created in six days? Do we really believe that God actually – physically – spoke to people as recorded in the Torah? Do we really believe that bad things that happen to people – natural disasters like floods, droughts and hurricanes or personal disasters like disease or early death -- are God's punishment for sins that people have committed? Do we really believe in animal sacrifice as a valid form of worship as described in such a large portion of the Torah? Do we really believe that women should be subordinate to men as indicated in numerous portions of the Torah? Do we really believe that homosexuals should be executed as stated in the Torah? Do we really believe that slavery should be permitted?

On the other hand, there are so many ethical and moral laws in the Torah which have eternal value. Love your neighbor as yourself. Help protect someone else's property even if he is your enemy. Do not steal. Honor your parents. Use honest weights and measures. Take care of the handicapped. Provide for the poor. Don't bear a grudge. Don't commit adultery. .

Be kind to the stranger. This commandment regarding the stranger appears in the Torah 36 times. It appears more than any other commandment

So, by contemporary standards, there are many things in the Torah which we would find morally and ethically offensive. Yet there are other things in the Torah which have eternal moral and ethical validity. So what do we make of all this?

I think we have to view the Torah not as God revealing Him/Herself to human beings. God is beyond human understanding. God is beyond human comprehension. But the Torah represents the history of the Jewish people's attempt to understand God's will, an attempt which can never be completely fulfilled. And our attempt to understand God's will is an evolving process. Much of what is in the Torah represents a culture which existed in biblical times but which we, today, have morally and ethically outgrown. Sometimes the attempt of people in biblical times to understand God's will missed the mark. In other cases, the attempt was right on the mark. But God gave us the mental and spiritual capacity to evolve into more morally and ethically sensitive human beings.

The Torah tells us that in biblical times God physically spoke to people and told them what He/She wanted them to do. I doubt that this actually happened. But God does speak to us. God's voice is the voice of conscience which is embedded within each human being. Throughout life, that voice is there telling us the right thing to do. We don't always listen to the voice telling us what to do. But the voice is there. We have the free will to listen to the voice or disregard it. But it is there trying to nudge us to do the right thing. But whether we do the right thing is up to each of us.

So we have to pay great reverence and homage to the Torah. But we have to recognize that it was written thousands of years ago and in many respects was an expression of the times in which it was written. And much of it is really poetry and metaphor. It represented an attempt by the Israelites to search for the will of God. But the Torah is really the first word and not the last word. Our search is an ever-continuing search as we become more ethically and morally sensitive. The principles were laid down in the Torah. But the search continues.

DONATIONS AND DEDICATIONS TO TEMPLE SHALOM

Dedication donations to Temple Shalom can be made in several ways.

1. **DEDICATE A HIGH HOLIDAY OR MISHKAN T'FILAH PRAYER BOOK** in honor of, or in memory of, a person or event. The cost is \$50.00 and a Dedication placard will be placed in the front of the prayer book.
2. **MEMORIAL BOARD PLAQUES** (for or by members only) can be ordered by filling out this form and enclosing payment of at least \$100.00 of the \$200.00 total cost per plaque. Memorial board plaques are ordered and take at least six weeks to be completed. The remainder of your payment is due within a year from the order, but appreciated as soon as possible.
3. **TREE OF LIFE PLAQUES (LEAF)** (for members only) commemorate a happy life occasion and are the memory board of Temple Shalom. Each small plaque (leaf) is \$50.00 and large plaque (leaf) is \$75.00. It takes approximately one week to process and engrave. Commemorate special events such as birthdays, anniversaries, graduations, grandchildren events, and any other life events we all love to celebrate.
4. **HIGH HOLIDAY DONATION** is a great way to make an annual donation to Temple Shalom.
5. **CHAI CLUB OF TEMPLE SHALOM** is a unique way to support Temple Shalom with a donation of \$18 per month per individual. The club is open to everyone. This can be set up on a monthly pay basis or \$216.00 per year. There are no club meetings or responsibilities.
