A Letter from the President September 2022

At the URJ Presidents' Quarterly Meeting, Rabbi Rick Jacobs shared the following quote: "We all know about posttraumatic stress syndrome but Psychologist Richard Tedeschi has researched a different phenomenon which he calls posttraumatic growth. He found that traumatic experiences can spur positive change, including the exploration of new possibilities, improved relationships, and spiritual growth."

COVID has certainly been a traumatic experience for us as individuals and as a congregation. Antisemitism is an ever-present backdrop to our lives as Jews. A number of our original founding members have passed away or have moved away after losing a spouse. This is not the same world nor are we the same congregation or people that we were 17 years ago, or 10 years ago or even 1 year ago.

Prior to COVID, we attended services when it was convenient. During COVID, I never missed a Friday night even if it meant skipping dinner. I needed that connection more than I needed food. The exploration of new possibilities – I never imagined being president of a synagogue. One Friday night, as we listened to Cookie ask for volunteers, I said to Mike, "I could do that!" When Lily Ann called 2 days later and asked if I would consider running for president of Temple Shalom, I said, "Yes, I can do that!"


Over a year has passed since that day. There have been times when I was frustrated, overwhelmed, or exhausted; however, I have never regretted saying, "Yes." Every webinar, board meeting, event and newsletter is an opportunity to explore and create new moments. Existing relationships have been strengthened and new relationships have been gained. I appreciate the opportunities that I have had for spiritual growth: writing outlines for services, writing a play for Purim, researching and writing D'var Torahs (sometimes two for the same weekend), and reading from Torah at our Sefer Torah celebration.

As a congregation, Temple Shalom has been exploring and continues to explore new possibilities: recognizing and supporting that each of us has individual challenges and making accommodations accordingly so that all of us can participate in services, activities, and meals. We are exploring varying service times. We are alternating between Rabbi led and Lay led services. We had a guest lecturer from Israel after a service and before the Oneg. We have improved and continue to improve our security.

We have formed new relationships and continue to improve our relationships. We have joined URJ (Union for Reform Judaism), SCN (Secure Communities Network) and have been adopted by the Charleston Jewish Federation. Congregants have been encouraged to participate in Board meetings as both observers and during Congregant Speak-out. Life event cards are being sent to all congregants. Everyone has been given the opportunity to lead and/or take an active part in services. We have added more opportunities to eat, learn, play and socialize together.

The commandment to love the stranger, to be kind to the stranger, to welcome the stranger, appears in the Torah thirty-six times, more than any other mitzvah.

The following anecdote appears in the book, *A Code of Jewish Ethics*, by Rabbi Joseph Telushkin:

Professor Stephen Carter, an African-American, tells of an incident from his youth, when his parents moved from an African-American neighborhood to a white one in Washington, D.C. Carter remembers how uncomfortable he was about the move. Sitting on the front steps of his new house with his brothers and sisters, “we waited for somebody to say hello, to welcome us. Nobody did....I knew we were not welcome here. I knew we would have no friends here.”

But Carter’s fears and trepidations were set at ease by one person who, it turned out, was a religious Jew: “All at once a white woman arriving home from work at the house across the street from ours turned and smiled with obvious delight and waved and called out, ‘Welcome!’ in a booming confident voice I would come to love. She bustled into her house, only to emerge minutes later with a huge tray of cream cheese and jelly sandwiches, which she carried to our porch and offered around with her ready smile, simultaneously feeding and greeting the children of a family she had never met – and an African-American family at that – with nothing to gain for herself except perhaps the knowledge that she had done the right thing. We were strangers, African-American strangers, and she went out of her

way to make us feel welcome.

The woman's name was Sara Kestenbaum, and she died much too soon, but she remains, in my experience, one of the great exemplars of what is best about civility....She managed in the course of a single day to turn us from strangers into friends, a remarkable gift that few have....To this day, I can close my eyes and feel on my tongue the smooth, slick sweetness of the cream cheese and jelly sandwiches that I gobbled on that summer afternoon when I discovered how a single act of genuine and unassuming civility can change a life forever.

Welcoming strangers is a great mitzvah. Someone cannot be a good Jew and a good human being if he/she is not welcoming to strangers.

Mary and I wish you all a shana tova. A good year.

Notes from the Board of Directors meeting on Sunday, August 14:

1. Crisis Preparedness:

The Building Assessment by Secure Communities Network (SCN) has been completed. Copies were sent to the Committee and the Executive Board. A meeting will be set up in the near future for these two groups to discuss the report and a plan of action. Following this meeting, the report and Temple Shalom's plan of action will be shared with the Board and with the congregation.

The Jewish Federation has agreed to allow SCN to share alerts with members of the Board and the Committee. For the low price of \$1 per person, we have 10 people requesting to register for alerts.

SCN is presenting webinars on security in preparation for the High Holidays. Board and Committee members have registered to join the webinars.

2. High Holiday services will continue to be free. Tickets will be emailed to members to present at the door for each holiday. Non-members will need to register in advance with picture ID and proof of

vaccination to receive an emailed ticket to present at the door for each holiday. Letters asking for donations will be emailed with the tickets for members and with the invitation for non-members.

3. Once again, we will be offering members the use of the Sukkah for meals with family and friends during the week of October 9-16. Reservations must be made in advance. Food, drinks, clean-up, and trash are the responsibility of the attendees.
4. For the High Holidays this year, our new Torah will be wearing a white tallit instead of a mantle. While unusual today, it is known that in ancient times important scrolls were regularly wrapped in woolen or linen cloth. We will look into purchasing a white mantle for next year.

On **Wednesday, September 7 at 3:00 P.M.**, Temple Shalom's President and Vice President (Hope and Linda) are hosting a member's only **Rock Painting Party**. Supplies (rocks, acrylic paints, brushes and paint pens) and snacks will be provided. The rocks will be delivered to All Souls Waccamaw Unitarian Universalist Church on September 11 to decorate the garden around the Peace Pole that they are dedicating. Rabbi David will be one of the keynote speakers that day. Please join us for a fun and relaxing afternoon of painting, snacking and conversation. Dedication donations to Temple Shalom can be made in several ways.

1. **DEDICATE A HIGH HOLIDAY OR MISHKAN T'FILAH PRAYER BOOK** in honor of, or in memory of, a person or event. The cost is \$50.00 and a Dedication placard will be placed in the front of the prayer book.
2. **MEMORIAL BOARD PLAQUES** (for or by members only) can be ordered by filling out this form and enclosing payment of at least \$100.00 of the \$200.00 total cost per plaque. Memorial board plaques are ordered and take at least six weeks to be completed. The remainder of your payment is due within a year from the order, but appreciated as soon as possible.
3. **TREE OF LIFE PLAQUES (LEAF)** (for members only) commemorate a happy life occasion and are the memory board of Temple Shalom. Each small plaque (leaf) is \$50.00 and large plaque (leaf) is \$75.00. It takes approximately one week to process and engrave. Commemorate special events such as birthdays, anniversaries, graduations, grandchildren events, and any other life events we all love to celebrate.
4. **HIGH HOLIDAY DONATION** is a great way to make an annual donation to Temple Shalom.
5. **CHAI CLUB OF TEMPLE SHALOM** is a unique way to support Temple Shalom with a donation of \$18 per month per individual. The club is open to everyone. This can be set up on a monthly pay basis or \$216.00 per year. There are no club meetings or responsibilities.
6. **YAHRTZEIT** is a wonderful way to remember loved ones who have gone before us. Congregation members receive notices prior to Yahrzeit observances.
