

With Purim coming, Michelle Foels and I were having a discussion about Hamantaschen. My favorite Hamantaschen are made with a yeast dough and filled with mohn (poppy seeds and honey). They are the Hamantaschen of my childhood, my Grandmother's recipe, until a friend convinced her that cookie dough and prune filling were more modern (and less work). I was not a fan of the cookie dough, but my sister loved the change. My sister still makes Grandma's cookie

dough, but the filling is now apricot, apple or cherry (her children and now grandchildren would not eat prune). Michelle's favorite are chocolate, an even more modern take on Hamantaschen.

As Jews, what we eat is an essential part of our holiday celebrations. URJ features recipes for different holidays throughout the year. For Purim, there are 25 recipes for a festive Purim (<u>https://reformjudaism.org/jewish-holidays/purim/25-recipes-very-festive-purim</u>) and 9 cocktails for a spirited Purim (<u>https://reformjudaism.org/jewish-holidays/purim/9-cocktails-spirited-purim</u>). I thought Marcy Goldman's "Queen Esther's Jaffa Poppy Seed Tea Cake with Orange Brandy Sugar Glaze" looked like a wonderful recipe for putting poppy seeds back into Purim.

I am a big fan of Jamie Geller (<u>https://jamiegeller.com/</u>). "Haman's Ears With Halva Spreads" would be a big hit with my nephew's family while "Candyland Hamantaschen" would be devoured in my niece's home. I thought the "Crispy Persian Rice" would be a nice treat for Mike to make for me.

I am not sure how I managed to get on The Jewish Food Society's email list, but I am pleased that they found me. "Jewish Food Society is a non-profit organization that works to preserve, celebrate, and revitalize Jewish culinary life" heritage from around the world in order to provide a deeper connection to Jewish life" (<u>www.jewishfoodsociety.org</u>) From their mission statement: "At Jewish Food Society, we believe that family recipes tell the stories of how Jewish people live and love, how we celebrate and mourn; they carry with them the marrow of who we are as individuals, as families, and as a community. Jewish Food Society is dedicated to preserving and celebrating these recipes and the stories they tell in order to provide a deep connection to Jewish life and identity. We showcase the diversity of the Jewish experience and instill pride." For Purim, a recipe for Fluden (Layered Pastry With Poppy Seeds, Walnuts, and Apples) was shared by Yonit Naftali. Read more about her family in "*This Family Holds On to the Past Through Their Purim Sweets*". While browsing Amazon, I came across this cookbook: <u>Recipes Remembered</u>: A Celebration of Survival by June Feiss <u>Hersh</u>. "*Recipes Remembered* gives voice to the remarkable stories and cherished recipes of the Holocaust community. The first professionally written kosher cookbook of its kind is a moving compilation of food memories, stories about food and families, and recipes from Holocaust survivors from Poland, Austria, Germany, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Romania, Russia, Ukraine, and Greece." I love reading recipes and watching cooking shows. I am thinking about buying this book so I can tell Mike what I want him to cook for me!

This week's Torah portion is called Mishpatim, which means "rules" or "laws." It then follows with a list of the mitzvot or commandments which the people are to follow. This is not the only list of commandments in the Torah. These commandments along with many others appear throughout the Torah. In fact, the tradition teaches that there are 613

commandments in the Torah. And the Torah makes no distinction between what we would consider ethical commandments and ritual commandments. Thus, this week's Torah portion contains commandments regarding the treatment of slaves, the consequences of committing murder, kidnapping or cursing one's parents; the responsibilities of one person to another in cases of damage or neglect; concern for the stranger and the poor and the widow; warnings to judges and witnesses about honesty and fairness in court; taking bribes; making false charges; and stealing. There are also commandments dealing with the observance of the Sabbath, the sabbatical year when the land should be left fallow, the festivals of Pesach, Shavuot and Sukkot, along with those prohibiting the boiling of a kid in its mother's milk or worshipping idols, or even mentioning the names of other gods. Some of these commandments we would consider to be ethical commandments, dealing with how we should treat other human beings or animals. Other commandments, like the observance of Shabbat or the holidays or dietary restrictions, we would consider to be ritual commandments. However, the Torah makes no distinction between what we would consider to be ethical commandments. dealing with how we treat other human beings or other creatures and ritual commandments, which deal with our observance of specifically Jewish practices. All human beings should be bound by the ethical commandments. But the ritual commandments apply specifically to Jews.

In order to be an observant Jew, it is not enough to just observe the ethical commandments. All human beings should observe the ethical commandments. And to be a good Jew, you have to observe the ethical commandments. If we see someone who very strictly observes all the ritual practices of traditional Judaism, but in his/her dealings with other human beings is a thief or a nasty,

hurtful person, that individual is not an observant Jew. To be an observant Jew, you have to observe both the ritual practices as well as the ethical and moral commandments of Judaism. Someone who strictly observes the ritual practices of Judaism, but is an unethical, immoral person, is a phony. He/she is not an observant Jew. But what about a Jewish person who is an ethical, moral person, but has abandoned all specifically Jewish practices? Is he/she an observant Jew?

The great modern Jewish thinker, Rabbi Mordechai Kaplan, said, "The past has a vote, but not a veto." For the religiously-liberal modern Jew, Judaism is like going into a cafeteria. You have a wide variety of selections to eat and you're not going to eat everything that cafeteria has to offer. And so Judaism has a vast tradition and you're going to find some things from the tradition no longer relevant to your life, just as you will find some things in the cafeteria you won't find appealing. But the more you select from the Jewish tradition, the closer you are brought to your Jewish roots. Judaism has much to offer. "The past has a vote, but not a veto." But we can modify past practices to meet our contemporary needs. And we shouldn't just reject the past without exploring it. Judaism can make our lives more meaningful if we just give it a chance.

Many of the 613 traditional commandments are no longer relevant today. Some of these commandments can only be observed in the land of Israel and others deal with sacrificing animals, which we no longer practice. And from a Reform perspective, there are some commandments which we just reject as no longer being relevant in today's world. But there are still many Jewish practices which still apply to us today.

So let's say there is a ladder stretching up into the heavens and each step on the ladder represents a Jewish practice. And someone on the 200th step of the ladder observes 200 Jewish practices, while someone on the 100th step of the ladder observes 100 Jewish practices. And the question is asked: Which person is the better Jew? The answer is not so simple. The answer may depend on whether the person is climbing up the ladder or climbing down the ladder.






What's Happening at Temple Shalom March 2023




DONATIONS AND DEDICATIONS TO TEMPLE SHALOM
