



A Letter from the President July 2023

For 65 years, I lived by the school calendar. My week started on Monday and ended on Friday. Shabbat and holiday services were sometimes attainable and sometimes not. Over the past two years, I have lived by the Jewish calendar. This includes keeping track of who is doing services and when and making sure we have what we need for various holidays and functions. My sister's mother-in-law used to say, "after Passover, it's Rosh Hashanah." With that in mind, after Passover, I mark my calendar as a reminder to order the Lulav and Etrog for Sukkot and when to schedule our candle lighting at Market

Common for Chanukah.

In preparation for our annual congregational meeting in June, I looked back at our calendar -- Temple Shalom had a busy year! I present to you the year that was...

Celebrating Shabbat and the holidays:

Weekly Friday night services continued. With the return of Rabbi David and Mary, bi-monthly Saturday services were resumed. The building was open for in-person services with only a few closures for weather, a COVID outbreak during Simchat Torah, and faulty plumbing. Together we celebrated the Sefer Torah ceremony followed by a brunch in August and a Selichot dinner and service in September. We held services for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. We had a picnic for Tashlich and a community Break the Fast. We enjoyed a salad bar luncheon in the Sukkah and a Chayei Sarah cocktail party. December brought us together for a trivia Chanukah party and candle lighting at Market Common. We celebrated Purim with a service, a play, songs, costumes, a contest, a luncheon and distribution of shalach manot bags. April was our successful Passover Seder. There was a Shavuot virtual service and play and we were able to have an in-person service and salad bar/dairy luncheon.

Community:.

Our Temple Shalom family has come together to offer support in sad times. Whether illness, lifestyle changes, funerals, or memorial services – we have reached out and supported one another.

Activities and entertainment:

We had plenty of fun and food too! There was Bingo, Onegs, rock painting, Book Club lunches, and jewelry making. Bravo Broadway, two Dine and Schmoozes, movie night, and a Shabbat deli dinner brought us together often. Once again our two Mah Jongg marathons proved to be our biggest fund raiser.

In-person learning opportunities and trainings:

We learned together: Professor Arie M. Kacowicz on "Can the Israeli-Palestinian Conflict be (Peacefully) Resolved?"; Natanya Miller on what antisemitism is and how to respond; Jason Roebuck on situational awareness and on countering active threats. These events were informative and educational.

Thank you to everyone who chaired and worked to ensure that these events were successful.

Last year, we committed ourselves to try new and different events. Overall, it has been a good year. We were able to maintain several activities, while at the same time resurrecting others and introducing new ones. Thank you for engaging with and belonging to our Temple family. On July 1, our new year begins. May it be an even stronger year of engagement and belonging. We have lots of exciting activities planned.
