Not too long ago, a congregant came to me regarding the locked doors. The concern was the doors should be unlocked so people could just walk in. While I agree that unlocked doors are more welcoming than locked ones, this is not the world we live in.

Temple Shalom wants to be welcoming, but we also want to be secure. Our doors are locked but we have greeters to allow entrance. We ask that visitors Email ID in advance or show ID at the door. We will be putting in more security measures during the High Holidays. It is not our goal to keep people out; we want to provide a safe & secure environment for our members and guests.

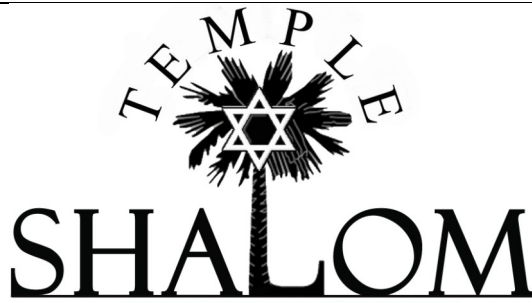
Thanks to the Charleston Jewish Federation and the Secure Community Network, we have had the opportunity for multiple in-person and online training courses. This training has helped to advise and prepare us so that we can be safe and secure both in Temple and in our everyday activities. The safety of our congregants and guests is of utmost importance to the Temple Shalom family. Along with preparation for acts of crime or terrorism, we will continue training for medical emergencies. We have purchased an AED (automated external defibrillator); there is a first aid kit on hand, and have taken the Stop the Bleed training.

Temple Shalom is no longer asking for proof of COVID vaccination. We are requesting anyone who doesn't feel well to please refrain from attending services. If you have been exposed to any illness and attend services, we respectfully ask you to wear a mask for those members who are vulnerable. We do not want to put anyone at risk.

Temple Shalom is firmly committed to protecting the health and safety of our members and guests. We welcome you to belong to our congregation or to visit as a guest and promise to continue putting measures in place to keep you safe. We appreciate everyone's cooperation. We all are looking forward to a wonderful Chai year at Temple Shalom.

I grew up in a predominantly Catholic neighborhood in Brooklyn, New York. Although I attended public schools, until I entered high school, all my friends, who lived in my immediate neighborhood, were Catholic and attended Catholic parochial schools.

My father owned a grocery store and my family I lived in an apartment above the store. Although it was a predominantly Catholic neighborhood, many of the storekeepers were Jewish. Across the street from my father's grocery store was a drugstore owned by a Jewish pharmacist. Next to the drugstore was a candy store also owned by a Jewish family. Next door to my father's grocery store was a shop owned by a Jewish tailor. On the corner of the next block was another grocery store, owned by my Jewish cousin. A block away in the other direction from my father's grocery store was another candy store also owned by a Jewish family. Two blocks away was a roofing business owned by my older sister's Jewish father-in-law. Also in the area were a Jewish-owned hardware store and a Jewish-owned shoe store.

All of these merchants weren't particularly religious. Their businesses were always open on Saturdays and all Jewish holidays throughout the year, with one exception, the Jewish High Holidays of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. On Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, every Jewish merchant in the community closed his business and attended services at a local synagogue. Even when Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur occurred on a Saturday, the busiest shopping day of the week, every Jewish store was closed. At the time, there was a saying that if you wanted to know how many Jewish adults lived in a community, you should count the house at religious services at the local synagogues on Kol Nidre night, the eve of Yom Kippur.

A non-Jewish neighbor of mine told me that before moving to Myrtle Beach; she *had visited the area in September and noticed that many of the businesses at Broadway on the Beach were closed on the Jewish High Holidays.*

Jews suffer financially when they close their businesses on the High Holidays because there are competing businesses owned by non-Jews that are open. Yet, respecting their Jewish traditions is more important to these Jewish business owners than the financial loss they suffer by closing on the High Holidays.

The Second of the Ten Commandments states "You shall have no other gods besides Me..." We should take the meaning of this **Commandment in a very broad sense, not just referring to deities, but also to the god of financial enrichment, the god of indifference and the god of lethargy.**

Many of us are troubled by the recent increase in anti-Semitism in the United States. But how can we expect non-Jews to respect Jews and their traditions if we don't respect our traditions.

Every self-respecting Jew should attend services on the High Holidays.

Mary and I wish you a shana tova. Good health, prosperity and heightened spirituality during the coming year.

Wednesday Sep 20, 2023, at 1:00pm HEIDEGGER IN RUINS (Book Talk) Martin Heidegger's sympathies for the conservative revolution and National Socialism have long been well known. As the rector of the University of Freiburg in the early 1930s, he worked hard to reshape the university in accordance with National Socialist policies. He also engaged in an all-out struggle to become the movement's philosophical preceptor, "to lead the leader." Yet for years, Heidegger's defenders have tried to separate his political beliefs from his philosophical doctrines. They argued, in effect, that he was good at philosophy but bad at politics. But with the 2014 publication of Heidegger's Black Notebooks, it has become clear that he embraced a far more radical vision of the conservative revolution than previously suspected. His dissatisfaction with National Socialism, it turns out, was mainly that it did not go far enough. The notebooks show that far from being separated from Nazism; Heidegger's philosophy was suffused with it. In *Heidegger in Ruins: Between Philosophy and Ideology*, Richard Wolin explores what the notebooks mean for our understanding of arguably the most important philosopher of the twentieth century, and of his ideas—and why his legacy remains radically compromised.

Dedication donations to Temple Shalom can be made in several ways.

1. **DEDICATE A HIGH HOLIDAY OR MISHKAN T'FILAH PRAYER BOOK** in honor of, or in memory of, a person or event. The cost is \$50.00 and a Dedication placard will be placed in the front of the prayer book.
2. **MEMORIAL BOARD PLAQUES** (for or by members only) can be ordered by filling out this form and enclosing payment of at least \$100.00 of the \$200.00 total cost per plaque. Memorial board plaques are ordered and take at least six weeks to be completed. The remainder of your payment is due within a year from the order, but appreciated as soon as possible.
3. **TREE OF LIFE PLAQUES (LEAF)** (for members only) commemorate a happy life occasion and are the memory board of Temple Shalom. Each small plaque (leaf) is \$50.00 and large plaque (leaf) is \$75.00. It takes approximately one week to process and engrave. Commemorate special events such as birthdays, anniversaries, graduations, grandchildren events, and any other life events we all love to celebrate.
4. **HIGH HOLIDAY DONATION** is a great way to make an annual donation to Temple Shalom.
5. **CHAI CLUB OF TEMPLE SHALOM** is a unique way to support Temple Shalom with a donation of \$18 per month per individual. The club is open to everyone. This can be set up on a monthly pay basis or \$216.00 per year. There are no club meetings or responsibilities.
