Thanks so much to Lily Ann, and fellow leaders and supporters who helped create and build Temple Shalom !


All of this took unbelievable courage, dedication and years of hard work !

What is the difference between a religious believer – someone who has faith in God and a religious skeptic – someone who doesn't believe in the existence of God?

The answer to this question isn't so easy. There aren't too many believers who never have any doubts.

There are many things that happen that can test one's faith. The loss of a loved one. Severe illness and pain. Senseless violence like mass murders and terrorism. The loss of life and property resulting from hurricanes, tornadoes, floods, earthquakes and tsunamis.

And there aren't too many people who profess to be non-believers who sometimes -when a seemingly miraculous event occurs – who don't – at least temporarily – believe in a Supreme Power.

A rabbi serving as the principal of a yeshiva (Jewish day school) in Israel was asked if he believed in God 100 percent. He replied, "I have faith 85 percent. I get to the other 15 percent by momentum." I think what he meant was that he got to that other 15 percent by praying, by attending synagogue services, by studying and by performing acts of loving kindness. All of these activities brought him closer to God. All of these activities made up for his 15 percent of doubt.

Even the most saintly people can have their doubts. Even saintly Sister Teresa admitted that witnessing the squalor, the human suffering and pain in the slums of Calcutta caused her to doubt her faith.

I think that witnessing all of the bad things that happen in this world can cause many people characterized as believers to sometimes have doubts.

The difference between the believer and the skeptic is frequency of faith. There may be times when the believer has doubts. But the totality of the believer's life is based on the faith that there is a God, that ultimately good will prevail over

evil, that there is ultimate justice.

The believer may not understand the workings of existence. It would really be presumptuous of any of us to assume that we have ultimate knowledge. But the believer accepts the view that there is an Ultimate Benevolent Creator. The believer has faith that life has meaning, that existence isn't just a series of random events. The believer accepts that there is more to existence than the physical world, that there is a spiritual world that, in many respects, has more meaning than the physical, material world. Such emotions as love, compassion and duty are what make life worthwhile. These emotions aren't physical. You can't physically touch them. But they are there. And without them, life would be meaningless.

So where is God in all this?

God is the voice of your conscience trying to guide you to do the right thing when confronted by life's decisions. If you believe, God is there to comfort you during bad times.

None of this can be empirically proven. It requires a leap of faith. And that leap of faith is from the heart and not from the mind. Blaise Pascal said, "It is the heart that senses God, and not the reason. God is perceptible to the heart and not to the reason." But once you take that leap of faith, you will achieve an inner peace which is beyond the reach of the skeptic.

The relationship between God and the believer can be compared to the relationship between a husband and a wife in many marriages. The husband and wife may love each other, but there are times when they are angry with each other. Times when they disagree with each other. Times when they resent each other.

But it's the relative frequency of the positive versus the negative feelings that determines the binding nature of the marriage. If the predominant feeling in the marriage is love – despite occasional lapses – then the marriage is solid.

I think the same rule applies to faith in God. There may be times when there is a lapse or suspension of faith. But if you believe 85 percent, you can get to the other 15 percent by momentum. There are times when the believer's faith will be soaring. But there may be times when the believer has grave doubts.

But the believer doesn't throw in the towel. The believer keeps plugging and faith returns.

Julian "Duke" Brown of Horry County Police Department will train all members of Temple Shalom and *pre-registered guests* to prepare us to respond to emergencies, illness, and events that require some advanced training in first aid, CPR, and bleeding. *There will NOT be mouth-to-mouth resuscitation or getting on the floor.* We will learn to identify signs and symptoms of impending issues. Duke will discuss what information you should gather in advance and always have available for EMS services as well as how to control bleeds using tourniquets and bandaging properly and effectively. For many years, Duke has trained airport personnel, lifeguards, and all HCPD personnel.

We appreciate the assistance from HCPD Chief Joe Hill and Mark Martin who helped to connect us with Duke.
