

A Letter from the President June 2024

I am currently reading <u>Uncomfortable Conversations with a Jew</u> by Emmanuel Acho and Noa Tishby. Amazon states: "no question about Jews is off-limits. They go there. They cover Jews and money. Jews and power. Jews and privilege. Jews and white privilege. The Black and Jewish struggle. Emmanuel asks, Did Jews kill Jesus? To which Noa responds, "Why are Jewish people history's favorite scapegoat?" They unpack Judaism itself: Is it a religion, culture, a peoplehood, or a race? And: Are you antisemitic if you're anti-Zionist? The questions—and answers—might make you squirm, but together, they explain the tropes, stereotypes, and catalysts of antisemitism in America today." I would recommend this book to everyone!

Working in rural school districts in both Maryland (the KKK met in the county where I worked) and South Carolina, I have had many interesting and uncomfortable conversations. I was the city girl, the woman with a master's degree and no babies, the northerner, the liberal, the white woman, the Jew. I believe that I prospered and developed relationships in these rural districts because I wasn't afraid to have the hard conversations.

In Maryland, I carpooled with a teacher who was my opposite in all things political and physical. She was a conservative woman who believed her husband had more power in decision making than she had. She did all of the cooking and cleaning. She was into sports and going to the gym. She loved shopping but would wash the clothes that she bought to hide the fact that they were new. During our thirty-minute rides to and from school, we discussed everything and anything. We didn't always agree but we learned from each other. We also respected each other's uniqueness and found that our hearts for family, friends and students and our morality were very much the same.

In URJ's <u>Talk for a Change</u> Toolkit, the writers propose that "We should not just talk, but listen, learn, and act. When we facilitate meaningful conversations, we build communities of belonging. People need safe spaces to learn, to grow, and to foster understanding."

Participating in Temple Shalom's services and activities has provided many of us with a community of belonging. During Book Club, Onegs, meals, and programs, we have engaged in meaningful conversations, sharing who we were, who we are and who we hope to be. We laugh and cry with each other, share celebrations and support each other in times of need. I am blessed to be part of our Temple Shalom family. "Everybody needs somebody sometime" ... join us.

As a Jew and a rabbi who is a supporter of the State of Israel, I've asked how I should answer the following question: "How can Israel justify the great devastation which has occurred as a result of the war in Gaza?"

This is the wrong question to ask. The question should not be to blame Israel for the carnage, but to blame Hamas and ask Hamas how it can justify the carnage. Israel obtained control of Gaza from Egypt as a result of the 1967 Six Day War. But in 2005, Prime Minister Ariel Sharon removed all Israeli troops from Gaza and dismantled all Israeli settlements in Gaza. In an election in 2006, the citizens of Gaza voted to give control of Gaza's government to Hamas. And this is the last election that was held in Gaza. The Hamas Government has not held an election since it was voted into power in 2006.

So what does Hamas stand for?

Hamas' Charter calls for the destruction of the State of Israel. After taking power, Hamas began sending missiles into Israel. In response, Israel blocked the waters around Gaza to prevent Gaza's importation of weapons.

When students on college campuses protest in support of Hamas and state that Hamas is dedicated to fighting for the liberation of the Palestinian people from Israeli control, they are spreading a gross falsehood. Hamas is a terrorist organization and Hamas has established a dictatorship over Gaza. The dictatorship is run by Palestinians, but, nonetheless, it is a dictatorship and the residents of Gaza do not enjoy the civil liberties that we enjoy in the United States or that Arabs living in Israel proper enjoy. And it is interesting to note that the political Hamas leaders of Gaza don't live in poverty in Gaza, but in luxury in Qater.

So what did Hamas hope to achieve when it staged its terrorist attack in Israel last October?

Since Hamas has its military command posts and weapons depots in heavily-populated civilian areas, it knew that heavy civilian casualties and property damage would result when Israel responded to Hamas' terrorist attack. But Hamas doesn't care how many Gazan residents are killed or how many Gazan homes are destroyed because it also knew that Israel's overwhelming response to Hamas' terrorist attack would turn much of the world against Israel. Hamas' only concern is the destruction of the State of Israel. Hamas is not trying to liberate the Arabs in Gaza. Hamas is a terrorist organization and its only interest is destroying Israel so Hamas' leaders

can control the area. Hamas was disturbed by the improving relations between Israel and a number of Arab countries. Egypt and Jordan had established diplomatic relations with Israel in the 1990's and, more recently, Bahrain, the United Arab Emirates, Sudan and Morocco had established diplomatic relations with Israel. And there was an increasing possibility that Saudi Arabia and Israel would establish diplomatic relations with each other.

Hamas knew that Israel's response to its terrorist attack would turn the Arab world against Israel. Hamas is dedicated to the destruction of Israel. Hamas knew that Israel's response to its terrorist attack on Israel would devastate Gaza. Hamas' main goal is the destruction of the State of Israel and it doesn't care how many Gazans lose their lives in its pursuit of this goal so it can establish its dictatorial rule over all the land "from the river to the sea."

The students on college campuses demonstrating against Israel should be demonstrating against Hamas rather than against Israel. Those who belong to Hamas aren't liberators, they are terrorists. They knew that their terrorism would result in a strong response from Israel. But they didn't care.

So it is Hamas that is responsible for the carnage in Gaza. And if Hamas wants to stop the carnage, it just has to do four things. It has to free the hostages, it has to rescind the provision in its charter which calls for the destruction of Israel, it has to renounce terrorism and it has to stop sending missiles into Israel If Hamas does these four things, the carnage will end and Israel will contribute greatly to the rebuilding of Gaza.

But as long as Hamas is committed to the destruction of the State of Israel and to terrorism, Israel has no choice to continue its efforts to completely destroy Hamas. A permanent cease fire will only give Hamas the opportunity to rearm and engage in future terrorist acts.

It is Hamas that is causing the carnage in Gaza and it is Hamas that has the power to end it. And it is really mind boggling that so many college students are unable to see this.


