strength comes from our members who accept the responsibility of supporting a synagogue, attending services and functions, and volunteering.

Temple Shalom Membership Benefits

High Holiday services are free to members in good standing. Members are invited to have the honor of participating in the High Holiday services by doing readings or an Aliyah.

Temple Shalom celebrates the calendar of holidays There are many opportunities to participate in these holiday services and activities: taking a reading part, bringing food to share for an expanded Kiddish, Break the Fast, Hanukah festivities, Passover Seder. Our Sukkah is available for any member who wants to have a meal in it.

Security and safety trainings are available to members both online and in-person. Temple Shalom is part of the Jewish Federation of Charleston and Columbia, SC. Through this link, we access services, information and training from Secure Communities Network, including Active Shooter, Situational Awareness, Stop the Bleed and more. Secure Communities Network has direct links to Anti-Defamation League (ADL) as well as many law enforcement services. This information and knowledge is valuable for wherever you are.

While Temple Shalom's services are open to all, some activities are member only: Book Club, Bingo, group tickets for shows, and Dine and Schmooze. Other activities are open to guests for an increased fee: Shabbat and holiday lunches and dinners, Game Days, Art and Craft activities.

Temple Shalom offers Zoom activities that are for members only: Friday night and Saturday morning services if you are unable to attend in-person, Rabbi David's learning programs, congregant speak out at Board meetings.

Temple Shalom is a member of the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ). Members can participate in many online classes and trainings.

There was a chasidic teacher whose name was Rabbi Leib. Rabbi Leib said a righteous person is someone who lives Torah, not one who just preaches Torah. Your actions are more important than your words. You have to BE Torah: your habits, your motions, even your motionless way of being, are what

count. So Rabbi Leib said that when he visits righteous people, he doesn't go to listen to their interpretation of Torah, but to see how they behave from waking to sleeping.

So, as Rabbi Leib teaches, judge a person not by what he/she says, but by what he/she does. And this is what Judaism teaches. Judaism is based on the performance of mitzvot. A mitzvah is an act, not a thought or an idea. You perform a mitzvah when you do something, not when you think about doing something.

There is a chasidic story about a man by the name of Reb Zisha, who lay dying. And he was afraid, very much afraid, of dying. Reb Zisha's disciples were astonished that Reb Zisha was so afraid of dying. And they said to Reb Zisha: Why are you so afraid? If you are afraid, what hope is there for us? Your life has been blameless. You have upheld the world. Was Abraham afraid of dying? Or Isaac? Or Jacob? Did Moses have anything to fear about dying?

Reb Zisha replied to his disciples: How can you say that I have nothing to fear? I'll tell you what I have to fear. Do you think that when my Day of Judgment arrives and I have to appear before the Heavenly Court, I will be asked: Why weren't you like Abraham? Why weren't you as great as Moses? No, they will ask me: Why weren't you like Zisha? And what will I be able to say to that?

There is a potential for accomplishment within each of us. There is the potential for doing the right thing within each of us. Unfortunately, in many ways we never reach our potential and in many ways we shy away from doing the right thing. We can't do or be what we are not capable of doing or being. We all can't be an Einstein or a great baseball player or a great singer. We all have limited capacities and capabilities. But in so many respects, we fall short of the mark. In so many ways, we don't extend ourselves to do the right thing for others, for our families, for the temple and for the community. We get wrapped up in the trivialities of aimlessly living our lives without devoting our efforts to causes beyond our own immediate gratifications.

Zisha was worried that on that final Day of Judgment he would be asked: When you lived your life on earth, why weren't you like Zisha? Why didn't you live your life according to your full potential? And that is the question each of us should ask ourselves: Are we living up to our full potential?

Rabbi David will officiate at life-cycle events for congregants, mentor candidates for conversion and officiate at conversion ceremonies, provide personal pastoral counseling to congregants, and reach out to congregation members who are ill or in rehabilitation or nursing centers, via telephone or virtual communication media, with no fee for Temple members.

Our Temple Shalom family offers support for life cycle events. Members receive cards in celebration of life-cycle events. Birthdays and Anniversaries are acknowledged at services at the beginning of a new month. Members can order a Leaf on the Tree of Life for your simchas. Members receive a notice prior to a loved one's Yahrzeit and the loved one's name is read during services on the week of the Yahrzeit. Temple Shalom members can also purchase Memorial Board plaques for themselves and their loved ones.

Congregants have access to Temple Shalom's website Members Only Page. This part of the website contains a calendar of who is leading services, member only activities, an updated member directory, and photos of past and present events.

Our newest member initiative is Emergency Contact Forms. The board decided to create an optional form, where those who choose to participate, can provide information for notifying family and friends in an emergency situation if the member is unable to do so.

In these times of increasingly high antisemitism, finding comfort and strength together in a synagogue community has become more important than ever. Your membership strengthens both our synagogue and our Jewish community.

SHALOM PURCHASE NEW "WINGS" TO ADD TO OUR MEMORIAL BOARD

If you have been to Temple Shalom lately, you may have noticed that our MEMORIAL BOARD is almost full. Earlier this month, the Board approved a motion to purchase two (2) additional wings (that really is the name of the pieces) to add to the memorial board (one on each side). Each wing will hold 20 plaques, for a total of 40 more plaques on our memorial board. The total cost for this necessary purchase and installation will be around \$8,000.

You will recall that a short while ago we had to raise the prices for the plaques due to our increased costs. Those costs are rising again. To offset the cost of the plaques AND the cost of the wings, the Board also approved the following ways that members can purchase plaques and/or contribute to the cost of the wings:

PLAQUE PURCHASES:

- Each plaque purchased by a member for a deceased person may be paid in full or 50% at time of ordering and 50% when we receive the plaque (and before it is hung on the memorial board). Cost per plaque:
 - until June 30, 2024 \$250.00
 - beginning July 1, 2024 \$300.00
- Each plaque purchased by a member for themselves for the future will be the same cost as above based on the date the plaque is ordered and MUST be paid in full when ordering.
- If the member chooses to purchase a "Reserved" plaque to hold their spot on the memorial board, an additional \$125.00 will be added to the cost and MUST be paid in full when ordering.

CONTRIBUTING TO THE COST OF THE WINGS: All donations must be received by September 30, 2024.

- Each member who wishes to contribute to the new wings may douate any amount and will be listed on the donation acknowledgement plaque.
- Each member who donates a minimum of \$600.00 will be listed on the donation acknowledgement plaque AND will have the option of receiving one (1) future plaque (for them after their passing) and a "Reserved" sign to hold their place on the board at no additional cost. Donations of \$600 or more are NOT required to take advantage of the future plaque and/or "Reserved" sign.

PLEASE NOTE: Pricing is subject to change at any time as our costs increase.




