When the members started aging, they refused to listen to younger people with new ideas. After trying to have the organization move forward, the new members gave up. Their numbers started to dwindle as members continued to fight change. It had to be the way it was. In the last few years, as the old guard was disappearing, members finally saw the need to act and began modernizing how they work. May they keep functioning for another 70 plus years.

Mark Twain once said, "A human being is the only animal who's got the true religion – several of them." If the casualness and frequency with which we do things "religiously" is any indication, then Mark Twain's comment contains as much truth as humor. There are a lot of activities in which we engage religiously.

We play mah jongg every Monday – religiously.

We watch Jeopardy every weekday evening – religiously.

We watch football every Sunday – religiously.

We go to the beauty parlor every week – religiously.

I'm not objecting to any of these activities. I'm not objecting to the use of the word "religiously" to convey the idea of unfailing regularity. But so often the word is used by those of us who perform a lot of secular activities "religiously," while we fulfill our religious obligations only casually or not at all.

We are capable of ultimate devotion to marginal concerns, but only marginal devotion to ultimate concerns. In the curriculum of our lives, the electives have become the required courses. The required courses have become electives. In the curriculum of our lives, we're constantly majoring in the minors. Majoring in the minors – that's what makes so much of our living trivial and inconsequential -- spending so much of our time on the trivial and little or no time on matters of great consequence.

Which activities do we consider a "must"? Do they include attending services, reading a Jewish book, rendering service to the community and the temple, performing acts of loving kindness, donating to worthy causes? Or are those the things we'll do "when I have time," or "when I'm not so tired," or "when I'm in the mood'?

These are questions we should ask ourselves. Perhaps we should live our religion – religiously.

# A SPECIAL OPPORTUNITY TO HELP TEM SHALOM PURCHASE NEW "WINGS" TO ADD TO OUR MEMORIAL BOARD

If you have been to Temple Shalom lately, you may have noticed that our MEMORIAL BOARD is almost full. Earlier this month, the Board approved a motion to purchase two (2) additional wings (that is really the name of the pieces) to add to the memorial board (one on each side). Each wing will hold 20 plaques, for a total of 40 more plaques on our memorial board. The total cost for this necessary purchase and installation next to the existing memorial board will be around \$8,000.

You will recall that a short while ago we had to raise the prices for the plaques due to our increased costs. Those costs are rising again. To offset the cost of the plaques AND the cost of the wings, the Board also approved the following ways that members can purchase plaques and/or contribute to the cost of the wings:

# PLAQUES:

- Each plaque purchased by a member for a deceased person before June 30, 2024, will cost \$250.00.\*
- Each plaque purchased by a member for a deceased person beginning July 1, 2024, will cost \$300.00.\*
- Each plaque purchased by a member for themselves for the future will be the same cost as above based on the date ordered.\*\*
- If the member chooses to purchase a "Reserved" plaque to hold their spot on the memorial board, an additional \$125.00 will be added to the cost.\*\*

# CONTRIBUTING TO THE COST OF THE WINGS: All donations must be received by August 30, 2024.

- Each member who wishes to contribute to the new wings may donate any amount and will be listed on the donation acknowledgement plaque.
- Each member who donates a minimum of \$600.00 will be listed on the donation acknowledgement plaque AND will have the option of receiving one (1) future plaque (for them after their passing) and a "Reserved" sign to hold their place on the board at no additional cost. Donations of \$600 or more are NOT required to take advantage of the future plaque and/or "Reserved" sign.
- 50% is due when ordered and 50% prior to being hung on the memorial board or may be paid in full when ordering.
- Must be paid in full when ordering.

PLEASE NOTE: Pricing is subject to change at any time as our costs increase. If you would like to purchase a plaque, a future plaque, and/or contribute to the purchase of the wings, please
