Or it will quickly run away

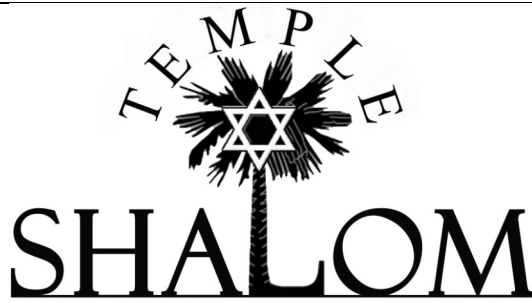
When it's time to hold the meeting

If you ask the average Jewish man or woman in the street why Chanukah is celebrated for eight days, they would probably say it's because some time in the distant past, a light had to be kept burning continuously in the temple in Jerusalem and there was just enough oil for one day, but miraculously it burned for eight days, by which time a new

supply of oil was obtained. This is a legend and I'd like to explore the story behind this legend.

In the Second Century B.C.E., a Syrian king by the name of Antiochus had established an empire in the Middle East which included the Holy Land. Antiochus was an evil man. He was a proponent of Greek culture and wanted all the subjects in his empire to adopt Greek culture and Greek religious practices. He outlawed Jewish ritual practices. He installed a statue of the Greek God Zeus in the Jewish temple in Jerusalem. A pig was offered as a sacrifice in the temple. Many Jews accepted Greek culture and abandoned their Jewish heritage. They were ready to completely assimilate, adopt Greek culture and totally abandon Judaism. However, in 168 B.C.E., a band of Jews known as the Maccabees revolted. Where does the name Maccabee come from? There are two theories. The Hebrew word for hammer is mah-keh-vet, which sounds like Maccabee. The Maccabees pounded on the forces of Antiochus like a hammer. The other theory is that Maccabee comes from the first letter of each of the four words in *Mee Chamocha Baeyelem Adonai – Who is like You among the gods that are worshipped, O Lord*. If you take the first letter in each of those four words – Mee Chamocha Baeyelem Adonai and put them together, they form the word Maccabee.

The Maccabees revolted and after three years they were successful in defeating the forces of Antiochus. Some scholars say their victory was achieved in 165 B.C.E. and others say it was 164 B.C.E. The Maccabees cleansed the temple and rededicated it as a Jewish temple. The word Chanukah means dedication.

The story of Chanukah appears in the first and second books of Maccabees. But these books are not part of the Jewish Bible. So the story of Chanukah does not appear in the Jewish Bible and was originally considered a minor Jewish holiday. But today, after

Passover and Yom Kippur, it's the holiday most Jews observe, probably as a Jewish reaction to the Christian holiday of Christmas, which occurs at about the same time of year as Chanukah.

But what about the story of the one day supply of oil in the rededicated temple burning for eight days? Well, there is no mention of this in either the first or second book of Maccabees. The earliest written mention of this is in the Talmud, several hundred years after the events in the Chanukah story occurred. So the story of the oil burning for eight days is probably a legend, but not historical fact.

So why, then, is Chanukah celebrated for eight days? Well, there is another opinion regarding this matter. Some eight hundred years before Judah Maccabee, King Solomon dedicated the first temple in Jerusalem. And the dedication was celebrated during the holiday of Sukkot, which, when we include the holiday of Sh'mini Atzeret which is added at the end of Sukkot, is an eight day holiday. It is likely that Judah Maccabee wanted his dedication of the temple to be as important as Solomon's dedication of the first temple some 800 years earlier. And since Solomon's temple was dedicated for eight days, the Maccabees celebrated the Temple dedication for eight days.

So what is the real miracle of Chanukah? It's not the lasting of oil for eight days, but it's rather the miraculous victory of the small band of Maccabees over the forces of King Antiochus, which allowed for the continuation of Judaism. If the Maccabees hadn't been successful, Judaism would have been wiped out. It would have been replaced by Greek culture. And without Judaism, there would have been no Christianity and no Islam. This was the miracle. And in the Jewish tradition, this miracle was brought about by God. As stated by the Prophet Zechariah (Zechar-yah in Hebrew) in the Haftarah which is chanted in synagogues at the morning service on the Shabbat during Chanukah (4.6), "Not by might, nor by power, but by MY (God's) spirit" were the Maccabees able to prevail and preserve Judaism. That was the true miracle of Chanukah.

Mary and I wish you a Chanukah Sah-mei-ach, A Happy Chanukah.

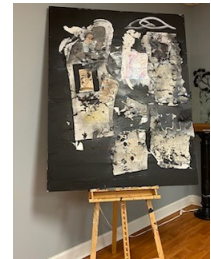
