A Letter from the President April 2025

Updates at Temple Shalom

NSGP Grant

The Federal Emergency Management Agency's Nonprofit Security Grant Program, has helped Jewish institutions across the country install security cameras, train staff, and add protective barriers, according to the nonprofit Secure Community Network, which gives security advice and monitors threats to Jewish communities nationwide. For the past three months, there has been a freeze on grants for synagogue protections as authorities and Jewish groups warn of rising antisemitism. We received an email from Stephanie Kitchens, SC Law Enforcement Division Office of Homeland Security, stating: "We are anticipating that FEMA will be lifting the grant holds within the next week and we will be able to begin submitting EHP's that have been pending." Temple Shalom cannot begin any project under the grant without these approvals that have been on hold. Fortunately, we are in the first year of our grant and have not laid out any money. There are congregations in the third and final year of their grants who have been very concerned about reimbursement for completed work. We also received this message from ADL:

From the rabbi

In this. my final article for Temple Shalom's bulletin, I'm going to review my fourteen years as the temple's rabbi. Before coming to Temple Shalom, I had served for many years as a cantor at both Conservative and Reform congregations while working full-time first as a high school social studies teacher and then as an assistant principal in the New York City School System. I retired from the New York City School System in 1991. I then obtained rabbinic ordination and served as the rabbi of the Jewish Center of the Moriches (Conservative) in Long Island, New York (1988-2001) and the Village Reform Congregation of Pembroke Pines, Florida, (2001- 2008).

Today, most pulpit rabbis attend rabbinical school full-time and their salary as a pulpit rabbi provides them with their main source of income. My rabbinic career didn't follow this model. The occupation of full-time rabbi is of fairly modern origin. The rabbis of the Talmud had other occupations. The great rabbi Hillel was a woodchopper, Rabbi Shammai the Elder was a builder. The great medieval rabbinic scholar, Maimonides, was a physician. In no way do I compare myself to these great rabbinic scholars. But I have tried to model my behavior after them by not depending on my rabbi's salary for my main source of income, even when I served in rabbinic positions which required full-time involvement. Pirke Avot, the Sayings of the Fathers, warns against using Torah study as a shovel to unduly enrich oneself (Chapter 4,7). I have tried to follow this teaching.

I arrived at Temple Shalom in 2008. At the time, Temple Shalom had weekly Friday evening Shabbat services, High Holiday services and a Passover Seder. Services were held at the Trinity Episcopal Church on Kings Highway. We then moved into the Myrtle Beach Senior Center and instituted weekly Saturday morning services, a monthly adult education program and services on the other Jewish holidays throughout the year. Solo, I led services every Friday evening and then the following morning. We had an adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah class. I made hospital visits to congregants who were ill. Every week, following Saturday morning services, a group of us would go out to lunch.

The temple moved from the Senior Center to our own rental facility in Conway and then, as a result of the generosity of a former member who left the temple a bequest in her will and the generosity of Ze'ev and Lily Ann Revitch, the temple was able to move into its own building on Belle Terre Boulevard.

In 2019, at the age of 84, I went on dialysis and decided it was time for me to throw in the towel. Mary and I moved to Delray Beach, Florida, where we lived for three years. The pandemic struck. I was named Rabbi Emeritus and via Zoom, as a volunteer, conducted a Passover Seder and one year's High Holiday services.

After three years in Delray Beach, I got bored, and hearing that there might be an opening for a rabbi at Temple Shalom, I contacted Hope. The congregation had changed quite a bit during my three-year absence. The congregation had become much more self-sufficient. Members were now playing a much more active role in leading services. Mike, Cookie and Michelle were doing a lot of things I used to do. Hope wanted me to lead services only two Friday evenings and two Saturday mornings a month. This was fine with me. Not only was I on dialysis, but I was also on a walker and had a lot less energy than I used to have. I no longer had the energy to lead services solo, so I recruited Mary to help lead the English parts. I also was no longer able to make hospital visits. And so, I've lasted for almost three years as Temple Shalom's year round part-time rabbi. But I'm physically weak, on a walker with back problems and will be 90 in June. So, again, I'm retiring. This time for good.

But one thing I've noticed over the past three years. For a congregation of this small size, attendance at Friday evening services has been consistently good, whether Mary and I are leading services or congregants are leading.

So, I hope Temple Shalom can find a rabbi to replace me. But if you can't, the congregation can continue with members leading weekly Shabbat services. You will need to hire someone for the High Holidays and perhaps for other holidays and events throughout the year. People may want a rabbi for funerals, but there are options available.

My fourteen years at Temple Shalom have been among the most gratifying years of my life. I have always considered members of Temple Shalom to be part of my extended family. If I were healthy, I would continue as your rabbi for the rest of my life. I love you all.
