## A Letter from the President October 2025

In an article entitled, "Rosh Hashanah Celebrates the Gift of Free Will" Rabbi Avraham Kovel writes "When we approach this sacred day, we're not simply hoping to avoid punishment. We're celebrating the staggering truth that the entire universe—every star, every galaxy, every force of nature—exists to provide the stage for our free will choices." In his article, "Yom Kippur: The Regret That Brings You Closer" Rabbi Manis Friedman writes "...Yom Kippur is not about regretting what could have been – it's about regretting what should have been. Because that kind of regret isn't a dead end; it's a doorway." So, both of these statements got me to thinking; what are some ways that we can use our free will to open the doorway?

Rabbi Aaron has been reaching out to congregants with phone calls and visits with very positive responses. I am more likely to send a text or an email with an occasional phone call (usually a response to someone calling me).

It isn't that I don't want to talk to people or spend time with them; I just forget to open the door and initiate a more personal contact. A few weeks ago, a friend suggested that three of us go to lunch. I would have never thought about doing this without a specific reason: a celebration, a meeting, an out-of-town guest. Maybe, all of those years of not having time to eat lunch or grabbing lunch driving from one school to the next has had a negative impact on me. Anyway, we had a wonderful afternoon together and I was so pleased to have had this time with them. And I want to do it again!

Writing this, I have realized that most of my friends take the responsibility of reaching out to get together. My resolution for 5786 is to open the doorway and initiate opportunities to interact with and spend time with others instead of waiting for someone else to be the catalyst.

I thoroughly enjoyed leading Rosh Hashanah services this year at Temple Shalom.

I am so happy that many of you had already been to Shabbat services in July – September, so that when I looked out at the people sitting in the sanctuary, I saw many familiar faces. I also appreciated just how participatory the congregation is. It was so nice that Rabbi David Weissman joined us online. I hope it was a comfort for you to hear his voice; after all, he led High Holy Day services for many years at Temple Shalom. His beautiful chanting helped to create a memorable Rosh Hashanah experience for me.

Thank you to Hope for getting and organizing the many volunteers who participated. I thank Cookie and Mike for leading much of the music – they had many High Holy Day melodies to learn and practice. Mike did a wonderful job as our Baal T'kiah –Shofar blower. And I thank the people who made sure that our building looked nice and was ready for the holidays.

It is true that Yom Kippur is a serious day, full of emotions. It is good to be able to celebrate as a community – so I look forward to the last blast of the shofar on Yom Kippur and our congregational break-the-fast.

Even though the fall is jam packed with Jewish holidays (I wish the rabbis had spread them out a little more), it is good to move from the seriousness of Yom Kippur to the joyful and festive spirit of Sukkot. Sukkot in Hebrew is also called Z'man Simchateinu, our joyful time to celebrate. So, let's sit and dine in the Sukkah as we celebrate nature and thank God for the fall harvest and for the number of gifts we have been blessed with.

Thank you also to everyone who has hosted me at your homes these past 3 months. You have taken good care of me and fed me well.

- Non-members affiliated with a URJ congregation Free due to reciprocity with proof of membership and ID suggested donation of \$36 per person.


